Introduction

The Navy has a long and glorious history, so it is a little surprising to discover that the Admiralty did not define Battle Honours until October 1954. This is when they issued their first definitive list of Battle Honours and introduced standardization on how to display them. This they did in the form of an Admiralty Fleet Order (AFO). Since then many updates have been published, eg, FALKLAND ISLANDS 1982, KUWAIT 1991.

Battle Honours are generally awarded by the Admiralty for successful war service rather than as a record of service.

A Battle Honour will be granted for those actions resulting in the defeat of the enemy or when an action was inconclusive but well fought, and in an exceptional case where outstanding efforts were made against

overwhelming odds. The AFO of 1954 rates them as:

- Fleet or Squadron actions
- Single-ship or boat service actions
- Major bombardments
- Combined Operations
- Campaign Awards
- Area Awards

It has been rare for a Battle Honour to be granted to a Royal Fleet Auxiliary, the first coming in World War Two. However, that appears to overlook, eg, their action within Malta Convoys 1941-42 or the Arctic 1941-45.

Battle Honours granted to an HM Ship are not eligible for use by a Royal Fleet Auxiliary of the same name, eg, ARGUS and vice versa, eg DILIGENCE.



Battle Honours Board – Official Battle Honours are recognized formally by being displayed on a board known as a 'Scroll'. This board is made of teak, the badge of the ship is displayed centrally and Battle Honours are displayed in BLOCK LETTERS.

Battle Honours boards are generally displayed in a position near a ship's quarterdeck, under the eyes of gangway staff. Such board is taken from ships that are being disposed off. They are returned to store for use in further ships of the same name.

Battle Honours Committee – the granting of a Battle Honour is formally ratified by the Board of Admiralty, now the Ministry of Defence Navy Board. This following a recommendation from the Battle Honours Committee. This Committee is made up of a senior officer representing the Second Sea Lord together with the Head of Naval Historical Branch.


