



is an autobiography – chapter 19 deals with Operation Lucid with the use, in 1940, of two War class RFA tankers as fireships.





Combat Fleets of the World. United States Naval Institute Press, Annapolis. 1977 to current, bi-annual (English language) reference book originally published as Flottes de combat in 1897. Arranged in alphabetical order by nation, the content include technical details and illustrations of warships, coastguard and paramilitary vessels and auxiliaries including RFAs. This reference book sometimes contains more details than Jane's Fighting Ships.



Described as a visual documentary of the roles played by helicopters by including operations from and with RFAs.





London, Annual originally published as Jane's All the World's Fighting Ships by Brown & Co, later S Low, Marston & Co Ltd, Jane's Year Books and now by IHS Global Ltd and known as IHS Jane's Fighting Ships. Arranged in alphabetical order by nation, this contains technical details and illustrations of their warships, coastguard and paramilitary vessels and auxiliaries. With pre-World War Two editions some caution is needed when researching auxiliaries. RN ref no BR762.

Johnson-Allen, John. They couldn't have done it without us — The Merchant Navy in the Falklands War, Seafarer Books, ISBN 978 1-906266-23-3, 254pp, bibliography, index, softback, £9.95, 2011. Chapter 6 covers Repair ships and tugs, Chapter 7 is RFA Ships.

Koburger Jr, Charles W. **Sea Power in the Falklands**, Praeger Publisher, NewYork, 1983, ISBN 0 03 069534 1, £na, 186pp, illustrated, bibliography, index. *This book is very much from an American point-of-view,*

good chapter on Logistics (Chapter 7) and Appendix F on the RFA contribution.



Lloyd's Register of Shipping, London, Annual. Lists major British and foreign registered ships. First published in 1764 as The Register of Shipping. In 1949 amalgamated with the British Corporation. Content is tabulated technical and ownership data of self-propelled merchant ships over 100 gross tons. Not all RFAs, particularly pre-World War Two appear in the Register.

and 1947-1977). The official list of British
registered vessels of 1 gross ton and over
compiled by the Board of Trade's
Registrar-General of Shipping Seamen.
Vessels are catalogued under steamships,
motor ships and sailing ships are listed
alphabetically by name with official
number, when and where built, basic
technical details and owners information is
recorded. Not all RFAs, particularly those
that were deployed for estuarial and
dockyard duties appear in the List.

quide to the Royal Navy, this hardback book produced by the Defence Procurement Agency in conjunction with **Directorate of Corporate Communications** (Royal Navy). Covers the full spectrum of current and future hardware of the Royal Navy, Royal Marines, Royal Fleet Auxiliary and Marine Services with extensive colour illustrations, summary technical details, support services, bases and establishments, RAF and Army aviation support. Contains some careers information and advertisements. *Although* described as 'a complete work of reference for the professional and enthusiast alike it omits information on, eg, rank structures, insignia, ships' badges and battle honours.

Mitchell W H & Sawyer L A, Wartime Standard Ships, Vol 2, The Oceans, the Forts and the Parks – merchant shipbuilding for British Account in North America during World War Two, Sea Breezes (Liverpool), 60pp, illustrated, index, 1966. Details ships built in Canada and the US including the Forts boats built for the British and Canadian Governments that served as RFAs.

Mitchell W H & Sawyer L A, Wartime Standard Ships, Vol 3, British Standard Ship of World War 1, Sea Breezes (Liverpool), 180pp, illustrated, index, 1968. Details 'War' named ships built for or acquired by the British Government, includes 'War' class that served as RFAs.

Mitchell W H & Sawyer L A, Empire Ships (2ed) A Record of British-built and acquired ships during Second World War, Lloyd's of London Press, illustrated, bibliography, index, 1990, 500+pp, ISBN 1 85044 275 4. Details the 1939 standard naming system adopted by Ministry of Shipping and successors for ships ordered or acquired in or by Britain to government account. This includes some Dale and Wave class RFAs.

Milne, Lt Cdr J M RN, Flashing blades over the sea – The development and history of helicopters in the Royal Navy.



Perkins, Roger, Operation Paraquat – the Battle for South Georgia. Beckington, Picton Publishing (Chippenham), 1986, 260pp illustrated and index, ISBN 0 948251 13 1. This is the detailed story of South Georgia and the campaign of April 1982 to recover it from the invading Argentine armed forces, a campaign mainly achieved by the extensive supporte by RFAs.

The development of mobile logistic support in Anglo-American naval policy, 1900-1953, University Press of Florida, ISBN 978083033679, £62.50, 325pp, illustrated, 19 appendices, bibliography, index. This is the academic reference work on the subject of maritime logistics and support operations by the Royal and US Navies. Comprehensively illustrated.






Puddefoot, Geoff, No Sea Too Rough – The Royal Fleet Auxiliary in the Falklands War – the Untold Story.


'errata' was issued but proved difficult to obtain.






